





Adult Ed: Lent





The Apostle Paul taught the early church that "there are varieties of gift but the same Spirit, 5 and there are varieties of services but the same Lord, 6 and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. 7 To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good....12 For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ." (1 Corinthians 12: 4-7, 12)



Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

We are the body of Christ at Grace Lutheran Church! It is a joy to share in this ministry with you and I share my excitement on the ways the Holy Spirit is moving through you. Thank you to everyone who was able to attend our annual meeting and those who contributed the reports of the teams and their important work. A special acknowledgment and appreciation for Joice Forster and Pete Odgren who were the 2023 Co-Presidents of the congregation. Their leadership, guidance, and sincere listening helped to prepare Grace for this year's ministries as guided by the Holy Spirit.

Grace has a very rich history of having strong lay leadership which is most clearly seen in the work of our Council and ministry teams. The Grace Lutheran constitution details the role of our church to be "a people created by God in Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit, called and sent to bear witness to God's creative, redeeming, and sanctifying activity in the world." To do this, Grace will:

- "worship God in proclamation of the Word and administration of the sacraments"
- "proclaim God's saving Gospel of justification by Grace for Christ's sake through faith alone"
- "carry out Christ's Great Commission"
- "serve in response to God's love to meet human needs"
- "nurture its members in the Word of God"
- "manifest the unity given to the people of God by living together in the love of Christ and by joining with other Christians in prayer and action."

To implement this mission of the church, a Council is elected each year to oversee the congregation and call special meetings of the congregation to conduct its business of personnel, budget, and property matters. Our constitution states "the congregation Council shall have general oversight of the life and activities of the congregation, and in particular, its worship life, to the end that everything be done in accordance with the Word of God and the

WORDS FOR WORSHIP

Sunday, February 4 - Fifth Sunday after Epiphany In Isaiah the one God who sits above the earth and numbers the stars also strengthens the powerless. So in Jesus' healing work we see the hand of the creator God, lifting up the sick woman to health and service (*diakonia*). Like Simon's mother-in-law, we are lifted up and healed to serve. Following Jesus, we strengthen the powerless; like Jesus, we seek to renew our own strength in quiet times of prayer.

First Reading: Isaiah 40:21-31 Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 9:16-23

Gospel: Mark 1:29-39

Sunday, February 11- Last Sunday after Epiphany
The Sundays after Epiphany began with Jesus'
baptism and end with three disciples' vision of
his transfiguration. In Mark's story of Jesus'
baptism, apparently only Jesus sees the Spirit
descending and hears the words from heaven.
But now Jesus' three closest friends hear the
same words naming him God's Beloved. As
believers, Paul writes, we are enabled to see
the God-light in Jesus' face, because the same
God who created light in the first place has
shone in our hearts to give us that vision. The
light of God's glory in Jesus has enlightened
us through baptism and shines in us also for
others to see.

First Reading: 2 Kings 2:1-12 Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 4:3-6

Gospel: Mark 9:2-9

Sunday, February 18 - First Sunday in Lent
On Ash Wednesday the church began its
journey toward baptismal immersion in the
death and resurrection of Christ. This year, the
Sundays in Lent lead us to focus on five
covenants God makes in the Hebrew
Scriptures and to use them as lenses through
which to view baptism. First Peter connects
the way God saved Noah's family in the flood
with the way God saves us through the water
of baptism. The baptismal covenant is made

with us individually, but the new life we are given in baptism is for the sake of the whole world.

First Reading: Genesis 9:8-17 Second Reading: 1 Peter 3:18-22 Gospel: Mark 1:9-15

Sunday, February 25 - Second Sunday in Lent
The second covenant in this year's Lenten
readings is the one made with Abraham and
Sarah: God's promise to make them the
ancestors of many, with whom God will remain
in everlasting covenant. Paul says this promise
comes to all who share Abraham's faith in the
God who brings life into being where there was
no life. We receive this baptismal promise of
resurrection life in faith. Sarah and Abraham
receive new names as a sign of the covenant,
and we too get new identities in baptism, as
we put on Christ.

First Reading: Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16 Second Reading: Romans 4:13-25 Gospel: Mark 8:31-38

Sunday, February 25 - Third Sunday in Lent The third covenant in this year's Lenten readings is the central one of Israel's history: the gift of the law to those God freed from slavery. The commandments begin with the statement that because God alone has freed us from the powers that oppressed us, we are to let nothing else claim first place in our lives. When Jesus throws the merchants out of the temple, he is defending the worship of God alone and rejecting the ways commerce and profit-making can become our gods. The Ten Commandments are essential to our baptismal call: centered first in God's liberating love, we strive to live out justice and mercy in our communities and the world.

First Reading: Exodus 20:1-17 Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 1:18-25 Gospel: John 2:13-22 faith and practice of the Evangelical [Lutheran] Church of America." Monthly, the Council meets to discuss the financial picture of Grace and discuss the work of the ministry teams.

Our constitutional bylaws define the work of our ministry teams as such: "all organizations within the congregation shall exist to aid in the ministering to the members of this congregation and to all persons who can be reached with the Gospel of Christ." Grace has a wonderful tradition of having one or more Council members serving on ministry teams. They are part of the discussions and decisions made by the ministry teams and then share their team report each month at our Council meetings. By doing so, our Council is made aware of the wonderful and thoughtful work done by each ministry team and shares their feedback with them as well.

Our ministry teams welcome your feedback, suggestions, and questions. The chair of each ministry team and their email address is found in our yellow Grace brochures and can also be visited in person. They will share your input with the ministry team for consideration so that your voice is heard. We also welcome new ideas for ministry as we trust that the Holy Spirit inspires each of us with our different gifts, passions, and ideas.

As we begin with our new Council and welcome our newest leaders, I ask your prayers for Grace Lutheran Church, our church Council, ministry teams, and your pastors. Our goal is to pray and listen for God's guidance to lead the church of today, grateful for the foundation of the past, into the future God is calling us to. We are fortunate to see new faces in the pews, at Open Door Meal, and smiling kiddos at BLAST each week.

Through your invitation, warmth, and welcome, three new households chose to join Grace at our recent Pizza with the Pastors meeting for those new to Grace. Please check out their pictures and other new members on our Gathering Space bulletin board. We are so glad they chose Grace as their church home. I trust God will continue to draw people to Grace to hear the good news of Jesus. Your Council, ministry teams, pastors, and staff will continue to diligently work to provide ministries that are meaningful and full of the Good News!

2023 Ministry Report



As another year has drawn to a close, we give thanks for what has been and look forward with anticipation and hope.

In 2023, the ministry of the Southeastern Minnesota Synod continued in earnest. Sixty-two congregations engaged in the call process even as some continue their call process into the new year. We were delighted to welcome 21 new rostered ministers into various settings within the synod.

For the first time in several years, we hosted a visit from a global companion synod. Bishop Atahualpa Hernandez of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Colombia (IELCO) spent a week visiting our synod's leaders, members, and ministries. It was a joy to spend time with him and learn from IELCO's excellent diaconal ministry among the most vulnerable in Colombia.

Our 2023 Synod Assembly, held in May, welcomed Dr. Susan Brower as the keynote speaker. Dr. Brower helped us understand demographic trends across the state and our communities. In May of 2024, we will use this information as a springboard for the focus of our next Synod Assembly. We will welcome Dr. Matt Bloom to share as we consider how each of us can impact our congregations and communities.

As I consider the ministry of the synod in 2024, I am drawn to the phrase every congregation connected. In 2023, congregations took advantage of the connections we have with each other; this was especially evident in the continued increase of collaborations between individual congregations. Throughout the synod, congregations have strengthened ministry through partnering with neighboring congregations.

As we draw on the strength of our internal connections, we have an opportunity to engage afresh with the communities our congregations are already a part of. What opportunities are there to be the church for the community beyond our buildings? What is already happening that we can come alongside? What needs of our neighbors currently need to be met?

One of the gifts of being a congregation of the Southeastern Minnesota Synod is that no congregation must go it alone. We are part of a network with congregations and connections that strengthen us and multiply the impact we have in the communities to which we are called.

May the Spirit open our hearts and minds to all the ways God continues to invite us to participate in God's good work in the world!

Lent Begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14!

The season of Lent begins on Wednesday, February 14, with Ash Wednesday. Lent is a season of repentance and self-examination where we see what is not life-giving, ask for God's forgiveness, and turn our lives back around to God. In the sanctuary, you will find a black box which is our Baggage Box. During this season, you are invited to write down any burden, sin, shame, or fear that is weighing you down and holding you back in your life and relationship with

God and one another. On Easter morning, we will burn this box as a symbol of the refining fire of the Holy Spirit, lighting the Christ Candle from these flames. On Ash Wednesday, we will be joining with our ecumenical partners for a community Noon service held at First Congregational United Church of Christ as well as worship at 6:30PM at Grace. Confirmation students and their mentors are asked to worship together on Wednesdays in Lent as we sing Holden Evening Prayer together with a time for discussion, ending at 7:30PM. We will also offer Holden Evening Prayer Wednesdays at noon in the chapel. We hope you will come for a time of mid-week reflection, to take a breath, and acknowledge the presence of Christ in our midst.

<u>Call to Order</u>: Pete Odgren called the meeting to order at 10:45 am.

The Devotional was given today by Pete Odgren. It was on putting others first for the betterment of God's work.

Financial Report: Jane Reiman gave the Oct. 2023 Financial Report. She reported the budget is down 4% from last month. We also discussed the proposed 2024 budget and will present it to the congregation at the yearly congregation budget meeting in January.

A motion to approve the October 2023 Financial Report was made by Joice Forster and seconded by Joshua Ensrud. Motion carried.


